At BGACDC's annual community banquet in November, local area fifth graders presented a play, "Fulfillment," that illustrated both the progress and frustrations from the days of Dr. Martin Luther King until today and the need to take hope and lessons from a past generation. January will mark the 36th anniversary of the founding of Boys, Girls, Adults Community Development Center on a bleak winter day in 1978 - a day that followed the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in nearby Memphis by ten years and that preceded the inauguration of the first black American president by 31 years.
